#### **PRINCIPAL REPORT**

Hello everyone,

Great news – there is a plan for our students to return to school! After five weeks of remote learning, the Premier's announcement that children will return to school was exciting news. The students are at the centre of everything we do and their return to school will bring the energy and positive culture that makes Whittlesea Primary a great place.



Following advice from the Victorian Chief Health Officer, the Victorian Government has advised that schools can begin a staged return to on-site schooling.

In the first stage, students in **Foundation, Grade 1 and Grade 2** will return to school from **Tuesday 26 May**.

To support all school staff to prepare for this transition, **Monday 25 May will** be a student-free day.

In the second stage of our return to on-site schooling, all other year levels will return to school from **Tuesday 9 June**.

For those students who cannot be supervised at home and vulnerable children, the existing model of on-site schooling will remain in place during the two-week period from Tuesday 26 May to Tuesday 9 June. The current process that we are using to enable parents and carers to indicate the days

or part-days for which on-site schooling is required will continue for this two-week period.

All other students in these grades and year levels will continue learning from home until Tuesday 9 June.

Once a year level has returned, all students will be expected to attend school as normal. This means if you choose to keep your child/children home after their year level has returned to on-site schooling, we can no longer support their learning from home.

This does not apply to children who need to be absent for health or medical reasons. For those families, please contact us so we can make an appropriate plan.

This same approach is being taken by all government schools in Victoria.

To support the health and wellbeing of all our students and staff, our school will continue an enhanced cleaning routine and will encourage frequent hand washing.

If you child is ill or is feeling unwell, they must not attend school. They must remain home and seek medical advice.

While the Victorian Chief Health Officer has advised that students will not be required to maintain physical distancing at school, there will be a number of important changes to our school operations, consistent with health advice. This will apply until further notice. I will provide more detail about our local school context as soon as possible, but it is important to note that changes will include:

- adjusted arrangements for drop off and pick up, including possibly staggered school start and finish times
- restrictions on access to the school site for anyone other than immediate school staff and students
- the way we conduct parent-teacher meetings and interviews

## Logging in to the Premier's Reading Challenge with an eduPass account

- 1. Go to the Challenge application.
- 2. Select the School/Student button.
- 3. Select the eduPass login option. This will redirect you to the eduPass authentication page.
- 4. Enter your username and password. This will redirect you back to the Challenge application.

Student usernames and passwords for the app will be the same credentials used to log into Microsoft Teams and our school's remote learning.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge all of our Education Support staff for the amazing work they do in supporting our students and staff every day, be it at school or through remote learning this term. This Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> May is Education Support Staff day, so on behalf of all of our school community, we wish all our ES staff a fabulous day and look forward to celebrating with them on our return to school.



#### SCHOOL CHAPLAIN REPORT

## School History 1935-1940

These events are from the remainder of the eleven and a half years **William B. Campbell** was head teacher of Whittlesea State School. In 1936, he tried to have the school credited for teaching to the Intermediate Certificate standard but no action was taken by the Department. Campbell had the good fortune of being part of Whittlesea's Centenary. In 1937, the whole town remembered the arrival of

"The Whittlesea School today was crowded with old scholars who attended "Back to School" as part of the centenary celebrations. The president of the centenary committee (Councillor A. J. McDonald) welcomed old scholars, and Mr. D. Brough, joint secretary, welcomed Mr. John Ross and Mr. T. W. Jobling, two former teachers, who carne to take part. Mr. W. B. Campbell, present head master, handed over to Mr. T. Jobling, who took charge of the proceedings. The oldest scholars present included Mr. William Batten, aged 78 years, who went to the school in 1864. He still lives in Whittlesea." (The Argus Tuesday 9 November 1937)

The other big Whittlesea event in November of that year was the arrival of electricity. Before this, homes were lit at night with kerosene lanterns and candles. Street corners had kerosene lamps and these were lit at sundown by a local lamp lighter. On the evening of November 1, the town was in darkness, the hall lit by kerosene lamps; a ribbon was cut and immediately electric lights blazed over the township. Mr Campbell's residence received electric power but the school rooms were not to have it installed until 1950 (thirteen years later!).

In 1938, parents purchased a set of Children's Encyclopaedia to boost the school library. In 1939, there was a Young Farmers club at the school and the Endowment Plantation, on the way to Humevale, was well established with six years growth. Mr Campbell departed some time during 1940 and **Henry T. O'Toole** took the helm as temporary head teacher for the rest of the year.
