Parent Student Teacher Conferences

This term, we will be hosting Parent Student Teacher Conferences on Tuesday 21st February between 11:30am-7:00pm. This is a *Variation to School Hours Day* and students are only required to attend their PST conference time with you.

During your 15-minute conference, your child's teacher will share early learning progress. You will have the opportunity to hear about how your child has transitioned into the new school year and ask any questions you may have about how your child has settled, both organisationally and academically and socially and emotionally. Today, your child will bring home a pre-conference survey for you to complete and return next week. This information will assist our staff to prepare for your conference. To book a conference time, access your child's profile via the Compass App on your phone. If you do not have access to Compass, please call the office. If you find you are unable to make any of the available times, please email your classroom teacher via Compass to make an alternate time or call the main office. Please note that bookings will close Friday 17th February at 10am.

School Logo Hats

A friendly reminder that during Terms 1 and 2, until the 30th of April, school hats with the Whittlesea Primary School logo must be worn when learning and playing outdoors. This includes both breaks and PE, 34 sport and 56 (interschool) sport. In Term 3, commencing 14th August, school hat are again required outdoors as per the DET Sun protection policy. Hats can be purchased online through Academy Uniforms or in person at their Thomastown store.

City of Whittlesea Exhibition

The City of Whittlesea have recently opened an exhibition in the Great Hall at the Civic Centre in South Morang. The exhibition comprises a selection of works created by students for the Collectively Caring for Climate project in 2020.

Students in Years 3-6 created art works and many of these were printed as sidewalk stickers that were showcased around the footpaths of our school and Church Street. Whittlesea Primary School has 14 student works included in this exhibition. The image used to promote the exhibition was created by ex-student, Sylvia Hallam, now in Year 8 at Whittlesea Secondary College.



Travelling to and from School Safely

Please continue to talk to your children about travelling safely to and from school. All bike and scooter riders are required to wear a bike helmet in Victoria. Mandatory bicycle helmet laws were introduced in July 1990. This applies when riding: on roads and road-related areas such as footpaths.

School crossing supervisors assist children and adults to safely cross busy roads around schools, at drop-off and pick-up times. Students are expected to walk bikes and scooters across the road and hold footballs and basketballs securely.

Church Carpark

It is also timely to remind parents about the safe and appropriate use of the church car park. It is through the generosity of the Whittlesea-Kinglake Anglican Church that our families continue to use this carpark as a drop off and pick up point. Please refrain from using the Disabled Parking Bay unless you have a valid parking permit. We have a number of families that utilise this space to drop off and pick up their children. Victoria Police will continue to monitor the carpark and issue fines when cars do not display a valid parking permit.

SCHOOL COUNCIL ELECTIONS

School Council Elections – Information for Parents We have 5 vacancies for parents to join our School Council this year.

To stand for election, you will need to arrange to complete a nomination form or for someone to nominate you as a candidate in the parent category. Once the nomination form is completed (available from the office), return it to the office by the close of nominations on Friday 17th February by 4.00 p.m.

Along with a nomination, we ask each candidate to provide a brief background statement. This can be used to introduce new councillors to the community, or to enable an informed decision to be made should an election be necessary.

What is a school council and what does it do?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally formed bodies that are given powers to set the key directions of a school within centrally provided guidelines. In doing this, a school council is able to directly influence the quality of education that the school provides for its students.

Who is on the school council?

There are three possible categories of membership:

- A mandated elected Parent category. More than one third of the total members must be from this category. Department of Education and Training (DET) employees can be Parent members at their child's school as long as they are not employed at the school.
- A mandated elected DET employee category. Members of this category may make up no more than one third of the total membership of school council. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.
- An optional Community member category. Its members are appointed by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experiences. DET employees are not eligible to be Community members.

The term of office for members is two years. Half the members must retire each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

Why is Parent membership so important?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills that can help shape the direction of the school.

Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

How can you become involved?

The most obvious way is to vote in the elections, which are held in February each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant. In view of this, you might seriously consider:

- standing for election as a member of the school council
- encouraging another person to stand for election.

Do I need special experience to be on school council?

No. What you do need is an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.

Ask at the school for help if you would like to stand for election and are not sure what to do.

Uniform Policy

PURPOSE

The uniform dress code will foster student pride in their appearance and the recognition of belonging to Whittlesea Primary. Issues of equality, health and safety, and expense are also factors that contribute to the establishment of the dress code.

AIMS

- To promote equality amongst all students
- To further develop a sense of pride in, and identification with our school
- To provide durable clothing that is cost effective and practical for our school environment
- To maintain and enhance the positive image of the school in the community

GUIDELINES

- The wearing of school uniform will be compulsory for all students
- The colours of the school uniform will be navy blue and gold, with the exception of a navy and white summer dress and will consist of a combination of items from the designated uniform list
- Daily footwear will consist of only traditional black school shoes (Lace up or Velcro only, no slip-ons) or black runners
- Socks must be plain navy, white or black no logos
- Students may change into any appropriate athletic footwear for PE / Sport lessons, regardless of colour
- Hair colours should be natural shades only. Hair accessories must be blue, gold, white or black only. Clear
 nail polish is acceptable. Students are also encouraged to wear a wristwatch. Smart watches with the
 capacity to make calls, text or take photos or videos are not allowed to be at school and should be treated as
 a mobile phone (refer to Mobile Phone Student Use policy)
- Piercings are to be limited to gold / silver sleeper earrings or studs to be worn in the ear lobe(s) only. No other forms of jewellery are acceptable
- Students participating in all school events (sport, choir, art and excursions) or representing the school in other activities must wear the designated school uniform
- Students will be permitted to wear their WPS House Wristband as part of their school uniform. No other form
 of wristband will be permitted
- A navy blue sun smart school hat with a school logo is a compulsory item during Terms 1 and 4 and a navy blue beanie can be worn during Terms 2 and 3
- Items of religious or cultural significance may be worn; head scarves should be school colours
- A Whittlesea Primary School bag is compulsory for all students
- A special year 6 commemorative jacket will be offered for purchase to all students in year 6 each year
- Upon discussion with the Principal/Assistant Principal, special payment arrangements can be made for those parents who find it difficult to purchase uniforms items

If a child is not wearing school uniform, the following steps will be followed:

- First incident Verbal request to student and a non-uniform notification slip to parents. Entry added to Compass
- 2) Student will change into the WPS uniform jacket/pants for the school day if available
- 3) **Second Incident –** As per actions in (1) and (2) and phone call to parents by class teacher.
- 4) Third Incident Referral to the Principal or Assistant Principal to follow up with a phone call
- 5) Fourth Incident Letter home from School Council

IMPLEMENTATION

- The student dress code including details of uniform items and the place of purchase will be published in the newsletter at the start of each term. The policy will also be available on the school website www.whittleseaps.vic.edu.au
- It will be the responsibility of parents/guardians to ensure their children are wearing the correct school uniform. A note must be produced to explain any deviation from the policy and given to Principal/Assistant Principal.
- The responsibility for the implementation of the School Uniform Dress Code rests with the Principal, Assistant Principal and classroom teachers.
- From time to time, parents may donate second hand uniform items that can be used at the discretion of the Principal and Assistant Principal.

RESOURCING

- The School Uniform Shop will be outsourced to Northern Regional Uniforms for the term of the contract.
- All families will purchase uniform garments from the above-mentioned supplier and these items will remain
 unaltered in their appearance. Embroided copies will not be permitted as it will be a breach of copyright and
 contract.

REVIEW CYCLE

This policy was last reviewed and approved by school council on Tuesday 24th March 2020 and is scheduled for evaluation and review in March 2023.



Mental Health at Whittlesea Primary School

As we come to an end to another school week, I would like to touch on the importance of having strong routines in place and how it can benefit both our mental health as adults and the young people in your family as well. Routines set out how families organise themselves to get things done, spend time together and have fun.

Why routines are good for children

Safety, belonging and relationships

Routines can be part of an organised and predictable home environment, which helps children and teenagers feel safe, secure and looked after. Having a predictable family life can also help children cope during development changes like puberty, or life events like the birth of a new child, divorce, illness or a house move.

Skills and responsibility

Having chores as part of family routines helps children and teenagers develop a sense of responsibility and some basic skills like time management. These are skills children can use for life. Children develop skills that they can use later in life and fosters a sense of independence.

Healthy habits

Routines can teach younger children healthy habits, like brushing their teeth, taking medicine regularly, exercising, or washing their hands after using the toilet. Routines can reduce stress, and lower stress is good for children's immune systems. Bedtime routines help children's bodies 'know' when it's time to sleep. This can be a big help when children reach adolescence and their body clocks start to change.

Why routines are good for parents

Routines take some effort to create. But once you've set them up, they have many benefits:

- When life is busy, routines can help you feel more organised and in control, which lowers your stress.
- · Regular and consistent routines can help you feel like you're doing a good job as a parent.
- Routines help your family get through your daily tasks more efficiently and free up time for other things.
- Routines often mean you don't have to sort out disputes and make decisions. For example, if Sunday night is pizza night, no-one needs to argue about what's for dinner.

What makes a good daily routine?

A good routine is one that suits your family. It also has three key features.

Well planned

In a good routine, everyone understands their roles, knows what they need to do and sees their roles as reasonable and fair. For example, your children know that they take turns with washing up and drying up each night after dinner. As children get older, they can have a say in planning routines.

Regular

Good routines become part of everyday family life. For example, you might all look forward to Sunday night barbecues with your children's grandparents.

Predictable

In a good routine, things happen in the same order each time. Everyone knows what to expect for the day. For example, you always wash school uniforms on the weekend, so you know they'll be ready for Monday morning.




Welcome Back
